THE SWINGS ARE IN!

After a vigorous fundraising campaign and 24 years of hard work by Villamay volunteers, McCutcheon Park now has a swing set! Mt. Vernon Supervisor Dan Stork and other elected officials were on hand on Aug. 2 for a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the accomplishment. In his remarks, Steve Markle, Chair of the VCA Community Park committee, noted the importance of collaboration. "This 26-year partnership with the Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) should serve as a model. When we work together . . . if we need something beyond our capability, they help us get it."



Markle went on to highlight the dedication of VCA volunteers to the park. "Over the last 24 years, we have put in 9,700 volunteer hours in the park, and we've pulled over 7,000 invasive plants since the pandemic."

A Long Road to Today. On February 4, 2000, the FCPA purchased the property that is now Gil McCutcheon Park from the Lamond Family, but there was no money left after the sale for park improvements. So, the VCA and its residents got to work, raising \$23,000, which was matched by grants from the FCPA. This campaign funded the original playground, but was not quite enough to cover the cost of the planned playground, which had a price tag of \$62,000. The swings would have to wait.

In October 2022, the VCA and its volunteers, with the energy of many new, young families and dedication of just as many long-time residents, went back to work. This time, the community, with the support of 62 families, four businesses, and the FCPA, raised over \$26,000 to bring swings to the park. Well done, Villamay!
